Garden Tip of the Month by Dennis McKiver

What can we do with our Rhododendrons this fall? There are several things we can do with our rhododendrons in late summer and fall to have beautiful blooms for our Rhododendron Show. First of all it's a good time to add some mulch to make sure we have the roots of our rhododendrons covered. Especially on the new ones we planted last Spring. Also, you want to remove weeds and other undesirable plants like berry bushes that want to compete for nutrients. If you want to fertilize now, do so with a low or zero nitrogen fertilizer. You want to enhance your blooms but you don't want to stimulate new growth. Summer and fall is when rhododendrons set buds. If they get a blast of fertilizer now they may put on a new spurt of growth instead of setting buds. That's ok if your goal is to get your rhododendron plant bigger rather flowers. On the contrary if you withhold water and nitrogen fertilizer in late summer it will stimulate your rhododendrons to set more flower buds. The other thing you can do is some pruning. Now is the time to remove any dead branches. I often get asked, "What's wrong with my rhododendron?", when someone finds a dead branch. Most of the time the answer is, "nothing". If the rest of the plant looks good, don't worry about an occasional dead branch. There are a number of things that can cause this. For one thing just like your roses, rhododendrons can be subject to stem borers that can kill a new shoot or young branch but won't kill the plant. Often times rhododendrons just want to shed branches for no apparent reason. After all rhododendron literally translates to "Rose Tree". Many of our rhododendrons are really trees even though we try to prune them into bushes. As a result your rhododendrons may just be shedding some branches to return to its natural tree form. Just look at some of the 50+ year old rhododendrons that look more like trees than bushes. If I have a rhododendron that I want to reduce in size next spring, this is what I do. I wait for it to set buds, then I prune off every branch that doesn't have flower buds. Then in the Spring when they bloom I prune off the branches with blooms as they finish blooming until I have the whole plant down to the desired size. That way I won't have a year without flowers. The other thing you can do is start grooming your flowers for the show while they are still in bud. Our show rules don't allow entering in the truss category a stem with multiple buds on one stem. We call this a 'Hammerhead'. So, what I do is as soon as the rhododendrons set buds I go over them and remove all the extra hammerhead buds. This will result in perfect single trusses that are bigger that if you had let these extra buds use up some of the plants energy. See attached photos.

Mount Vesuvius Day is always observed on August 24
